

# Agenda Item 11-D

## MAPPING DOCUMENT

This mapping document demonstrates how the material in the extant ISA 610 has been reflected in the proposed redrafted ISA. Highlight material identifies material that is proposed to be eliminated or repositioned to another ISA (as needed) as a result of redrafting. An explanation of the proposed deletion and other comments are provided, where appropriate.

<p>1. The purpose of this International Standard on Auditing (ISA) is to establish standards and provide guidance to external auditors in considering the work of internal auditing. <p>6. The role of internal auditing is determined by management, and its objectives differ from those of the external auditor who is appointed to report independently on the financial statements. The internal audit function's objectives vary according to management's requirements. <p>7. Nevertheless some of the means of achieving their respective objectives are often similar and thus certain aspects of internal auditing may be useful in determining the nature, timing and extent of external audit procedures.</p>	3	Material essential to set up the context of the ISA.
<p>8. Internal auditing is part of the entity. Irrespective of the degree of autonomy and objectivity of internal auditing, it cannot achieve the same degree of independence as required of the external auditor when expressing an opinion on the financial statements. The external auditor has sole responsibility for the audit opinion expressed, and that responsibility is not reduced by any use made of internal auditing.</p> <p><b>All judgments relating to the audit of the financial statements are those of the external auditor.</b></p>	4	<p>Material essential to set up the context of the ISA. <p>10. Effective internal auditing will often allow a modification in the nature and timing, and a reduction in the extent of audit procedures performed by the external auditor but cannot eliminate them entirely. In some</p>	A3	First sentence is in A3.

<b>11. The external auditor should perform an assessment of the internal audit function when internal auditing is relevant to the external auditor's risk assessment.</b>	8	
12. The external auditor's assessment of the internal audit function will influence the external auditor's judgment about the use which may be made of internal auditing in making risk assessments and thereby modifying the nature, timing and extent of further external audit procedures.	9, A9	The extent of the effect of the internal audit function's work on the work of the external auditor is expanded.
13. When obtaining an understanding and performing an assessment of the internal audit function, the important criteria are the following:	A5	
(a) <b>Organizational status</b> : Specific status of internal auditing in the entity and the effect this has on its ability to be objective. In the ideal situation, internal auditing will report to the highest level of management and be free of any other operating responsibility. <b>Any constraints or restrictions placed on internal auditing by management would need to be carefully considered.</b> In particular, the internal auditors will need to be free to communicate fully with the external auditor.	7, A5 8	As part of obtaining an understanding of the IA function, it is necessary to understand the organizational status Highlighted text moved to paragraph 8 – elevated to a requirement.
(b) <b>Scope of function</b> : The nature and extent of internal auditing assignments performed. (c) <b>Technical competence</b> : Whether internal auditing is performed by persons having adequate technical training and proficiency as internal auditors. (d) <b>Due professional care</b> : Whether internal auditing is properly planned, supervised, reviewed and documented. When planning to use the work of internal auditing, the external auditor will need to consider internal auditing's tentative plan for the period and discuss it at as early a stage as possible.</p> <p>Where the work of internal auditing is to be a factor in determining the nature, timing and extent of the external auditor's procedures, it is desirable to agree in advance the timing of such work, the extent of audit coverage, materiality levels and proposed methods of sample selection, documentation of the work performed and review and reporting procedures.</p>	<p>A7</p> <p>A7</p>	
<p>15. Liaison with internal auditing is more effective when meetings are held at appropriate intervals during the period. The external auditor would need to be advised of and have access to relevant internal auditing reports and be kept informed of any significant matter that comes to the internal auditor's attention which may affect the work of the external auditor. Similarly, the external auditor would ordinarily inform the internal auditor of any significant matters which may affect internal auditing.</p>	<p>A8</p>	
<p><b>16. When the external auditor intends to use specific work of internal auditing, the external auditor should evaluate and perform audit procedures on that work to confirm its adequacy for the external auditor's purposes.</b></p>	<p>10</p>

The evaluation of specific work of internal auditing involves consideration of the adequacy of the scope of work and related programs and whether the assessment of the internal auditing remains appropriate.
